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From Mayor J. Lynn Crane

Let me begin by extending the wishes of the Herriman City Council and staff to residents and neighbors for a peaceful, prosperous, and happy New Year. Indeed, the season celebrations create a spirit of unity, gratitude, and reflection on where we have been and what lies ahead. The promise of a new year generates optimism and excitement for Herriman. As it has been for each of the past six New Year celebrations, there is, once again, anticipation for many new events and firsts that are in the offering. While much has been accomplished, much remains to be done and significant activity and projects will transpire in the coming months.

Construction of the new Rose Creek Park continues on schedule. This will be a wonderful park facility with parking, restrooms, superb hiking, and jogging trails, playground equipment, picnic pavilions, and adequate space for regulation soccer fields and other sports activities. It will be a wonderful compliment to the City park system and provide additional opportunity for the outdoor enjoyment of residents. This park is basically the design of our own people (Brett Wood, Chris Hales, and Danie Bills), and I believe it accommodates a broad array of outdoor interests.

Commercial and retail development will continue in 2006. A Maverick convenience store at approximately 4600 West and 12600 South will be open for business by early spring. Herriman Plaza is underway and will provide additional retail and office services for the City. The Southwest Precinct of the Salt Lake County Sheriff's Department will occupy office space in the Plaza. The Council and staff are excited about this decision and believe that the increased visibility and presence of the department will be positive for the City. Other retail services will locate there including additional food services. A high priority for the City remains economic development. While much of the commercial interest appears centered along the Bangerter corridor, we continue to meet and visit with potential investors for the development of commercial services.

Continued expressions of interest in a local post office come to my office. This is certainly a significant priority for the City. That being said, a Herriman Post Office remains somewhere in the distant future. A Postal Service criterion for the location of a new site dictates a very significant population for approval. I will continue to pursue this objective and remain committed to the reality of a local Post Office before I leave office. There is, however, an interim decision of interest. Presently, the 065 Zip Code has more addresses than any other Zip Code in the state. State representatives for the US Postal Service have approved and recommended to the regional office in Denver, the creation of a new Zip Code for the Herriman area. While not official, it is anticipated that the recommendation will be approved and a new Zip Code will become a reality. A July 1, 2006 effective date is requested and hopefully will be approved.

The City Transportation Plan provides for the extension of 12600 to proceed due westward through the north part of the City to eventually connect with Highway U111. The 2006 budget

includes funds for the surveying, engineering, and specific route identification for the proposed Herriman Parkway westward to 6000 West and for the 5600 West roadway northward to an intersection of these roadways. The interest and development in the northeast sector of the City will require the development of these roadways. The future plan is for the redefinition of 12600 S. and U111 from the connections at the Bingham Highway and Bangerter as a State roadway. U111 will then officially be uninterrupted from the 2100 South Freeway to the I-15 Interchange at 12300 South. City efforts for identification of the route and infrastructure will enhance the eventual realization of the re-designation of this part of the connection as a State road.

Growth continues at unprecedented levels; new families establish homes and the demand continues for new facilities. A significant event for the coming year will be the opening of a second elementary school in Herriman. The school will be located in Phase 3 of the Fieldstone Hamilton Farms development at approximately 13600 South and 7000 West and is badly needed as the local schools continue to exceed capacity. There are at least six additional LDS Chapel site locations, of which I am aware, within the City. Unofficial population of the Herriman boundary is now 14,000 residents, a number never anticipated by anyone six years ago.

I will conclude by expressing appreciation to everyone involved in this adventure that has transpired over the past six years and, more particularly, the past year. Herriman City residents are wonderful and general support has been remarkable. City staff is, without question, the finest, most dedicated, and loyal of any with which I am aware. I extend to you my heartfelt thanks and best wishes for a happy and prosperous New Year.

Snow Removal Policy

We have received numerous calls from residents about our snow removal policy and we hope to answer those questions by including it in the newsletter again. Our City ordinance prohibits any vehicle parking on the street when it is snowing or snow is on the street November through April. If this ordinance is ignored it makes it especially difficult for the snowplows to clear the streets especially on dead end roads and cul-de-sacs.

The following are the most common questions with answers directly from our snow plowing policy.

When will snow removal begin?

- Snow removal will begin when two inches of snow has accumulated on roadways.

Can you come and salt my road?

- Salt distribution will begin when the temperature drops and there has been enough moisture for icy roadways.

When will my street be plowed?

- First, higher traveled streets and main access roads are plowed.
- Second, special attention is given to those higher traveled (collector) streets with hills and difficult intersections.
- Third, the secondary streets are cleared.
- Last, subdivision streets, cul-de-sacs, and dead-end streets are plowed.

My street still has snow on it and it's very slippery. Is there something you can do?

- Unfortunately, snow plows do not allow streets to be plowed down to the black top. The snow often gets packed down by the traffic traveling over the snow, and we will make every effort to distribute salt when possible to melt this snow.



Christmas Tree Pickup



Salt Lake County Sanitation will provide curbside Christmas Tree pickup again this year. It will begin after the Christmas holiday and continue for three weeks. Please place your undecorated tree in the park strip above the curb where you normally place your garbage. Your tree will be picked up on your regularly scheduled garbage day. Due to time and space restrictions your tree may be skipped on the first schedule but should be picked up on one of your next regularly scheduled garbage pickup days.

Snow Removal-Resident's Responsibility

Residents, business owners, and contractors are prohibited from depositing snow into public roads. Snow removed from sidewalks and driveways should be placed on lawn areas, park strip areas, or on private property, and **NOT** on public roads. This practice is dangerous and impedes the City's snow removal efforts.

Herriman City property owners are responsible for keeping all sidewalks along their property clear and free of snow and ice. City crews are responsible for clearing sidewalks at public facilities. If there is a fire hydrant in front of a resident's home, it is the resident's responsibility to keep it clear of all snow.

City ordinance prohibits overnight parking on the street from *November through March*. Residents can also help by removing trailer and garbage cans from the street from *November through March*.

General Plan

The Planning Commission, at their last meeting, held a hearing on the General Plan for the north part of Herriman City. There were very few people at the meeting to talk on the matter. A notice was placed in the water bill, hoping it would stir some interested parties. The planning firm doing the work for the City is Landmark Design. We have a draft plan, which the Planning Commission received before the hearing. We will probably place this on the work session meeting on January 3rd, and discuss any changes the Planning Commission wants before they make recommendation to the City Council. The hearing before the City Council will probably be in February with a decision in March. There are a number of important issues the City Council and the Planning Commission have been dealing with over the last year of the study. One of the issues is placement of the future City Center. This would hopefully include City Hall, a library, a post office, and maybe a new fire station. It would be a place to gather for the citizens of the City, and a focal point for our suburban City. If you would like to get involved in the process of approval of the General Plan, watch our website for future meetings and hearings. After the Planning Commission makes a recommendation we will place the draft plan on the website for comment.

Risk for Carbon Monoxide Poisoning Increases in Winter

SALT LAKE CITY – Carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning from autos, gas furnaces, and other appliances kills an estimated 500 people and sends more than 15,000 others to emergency rooms nationwide each year. In Utah, approximately 250 cases of CO poisoning and five deaths were reported in 2003, the latest numbers available. As winter approaches, and the risk for CO poisoning increases, the Utah Poison Control Center, Questar Corporation, and the Unified Fire Authority are reminding Utahns to know the symptoms of CO poisoning and take precautions to prevent it.

What is CO?

CO is an odorless, invisible gas produced when gasoline, natural gas, kerosene, and other fuels are not completely combusted during use. Automobile exhaust is the most common source of CO, but small gas engines, camp lanterns and stoves, charcoal grills, and gas ranges and furnaces also produce it. When appliances and furnaces are improperly adjusted and used in poorly ventilated areas, dangerous amounts of CO can build up in the blood, replacing the oxygen, and potentially cause asphyxiation.

Recognizing CO Poisoning Symptoms

Although everyone is susceptible to CO poisoning, unborn babies, infants, the elderly, and people with respiratory problems are particularly at risk. Because CO is invisible and odorless, it is important to know the symptoms of CO poisoning and to immediately seek medical help if those symptoms occur.

The most common symptoms are:

- Persistent, severe headaches and dizziness (usually affecting more than one person in an enclosed area).
- Nausea, vomiting and fatigue.
- The disappearance of symptoms when individuals leave the structure.

If the presence of CO is suspected based on these symptoms, evacuate all persons from the structure and call the poison control center at 1-800-222-1222, or 911.

CO Prevention

People can avoid CO poisoning through simple prevention measures and common sense. For example, most fire-related CO poisoning can be prevented by the proper installation and maintenance of smoke detectors. Here are some other tips for preventing CO poisoning:

- Have your heating system, water heater, and any other gas, oil, or coal-burning appliances serviced by a qualified technician every year.
- Install a battery-operated, Underwriters Laboratory approved, CO detector on each level of your home. Check or replace the battery when you change the time on your clocks each spring and fall. Installing a CO monitor should never be a substitute for a professional inspection of home heating and cooking equipment. Owners of boats and recreational vehicles with propane stoves or heaters should install CO detectors.
- If your CO detector alarms continuously, evacuate your home and call 911 or your local gas company. If the alarm is only intermittent, change the batteries. If anyone has symptoms immediately call the poison control center at 800-222-1222 or 911.
- Seek prompt medical attention if you suspect CO poisoning and are feeling dizzy, light-headed, or nauseated.
- Do not use a generator, charcoal grill, camp stove, or other gasoline or charcoal-burning device inside your home, basement or garage or near a window.
- Do not run a car or truck inside a garage attached to your house, even if you leave the door open.
- Do not burn anything in a stove or fireplace that is not vented, and do not heat your house with a gas oven.

Knowledge is the key to preventing carbon monoxide poisoning. Anyone who thinks he or she has CO poisoning should call the poison control center at the above number or call 911.

Waterline Enhancement Project Along 12900 South

Herriman City Engineering Department is currently working on a number of design projects for the culinary water system. The City staff is just finishing design of a new delivery point, pressure reducing vault, and a 16" waterline design along 12900 South. This project consists of constructing a new water delivery point from the exiting 20" Jordan Valley Water Conservancy District's (JVWCD) waterline located at 5600 West 12900 South. This new delivery point will greatly enhance the City's water system to provide water especially during the summer months. The City is working with JVWCD staff to take up to 5,000 gpm (gallons per minute) over the course of several years from this point. This will help the City's water system continue to keep up with current and future demands on the system.

In addition, a new pressure reducing vault will be installed. This will be needed to ensure that same operating pressures are achieved throughout Herriman City water system as it is delivered from the JVWCD system. This project will also include the installation of approximately 2,400 feet of new waterline along 12900 South from 5600 West to 6000 West. This waterline will deliver the new water into the Herriman City water system and will greatly enhance the water system to circulate the water throughout the City. This looping of the system will also improve fire protection throughout this area of the City. The project will install new fire hydrants along the new waterline as well as tie over the existing water services for greater service.

Stay Warm and Safe This Winter

As the winter cold sets in, the **Herriman City Building Department** urges residents to use portable heating devices, fireplaces, and wood stoves safely.

"With the high cost of fuel, many people may be purchasing a space heater or adding a fireplace or wood-burning stove to their home," said **Bob Hansen, Herriman City Building Inspector**. "When not used or installed properly, these appliances can present serious safety hazards."

Portable heaters can be an affordable supplement or alternative to central heating. However, when used improperly, space heaters can cause carbon monoxide poisoning, fire, and even death.

"Keep the area around the heater clear at all times with at least three feet of open space around the unit so that nothing catches fire," said **Dale Johnson, Herriman City Building Inspector**. "Supervise the heater when it's on, especially when children and pets are nearby, and turn the heater off when you leave the room. Also, don't leave the heater on at night."

Be sure you've installed smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors and that they are working properly.

If you're in the market for a fireplace or wood-burning stove, contact the **Herriman City Building Department** first to determine if you need a permit before installation and inspection by a trained professional.

"We recommend you purchase a fireplace or wood-burning stove that is labeled by an approved testing and inspection agency," said **Lon Christensen Herriman, City Building Inspector**. "Work with your builder to find the best interior location. That decision will be based on the chimney's path."

Once installed, inspected, and approved, the homeowner should read the instruction manual carefully to understand how the fireplace or wood-burning stove works. **Mr. Christensen** also suggests contacting your insurance agent. Most insurance companies require a rider to the homeowners' policy and a copy of the final inspection report.

During this time of the year, it is important to make sure that all of the garden hoses are disconnected from the hose bibs. Also the line to the swamp cooler, and the swamp cooler are drained to prevent any freezing on either of these. Please keep snow removed from around the fire hydrants and keep them accessible. It is your responsibility if the hydrant is in your park strip. If you see any lids off meter boxes, please call the City with the address or as close as you can get to the address, so that we can replace the lid so the meter and the setter don't freeze. We have experienced a lot of water leaks because of meters and setters freezing.

The water rate structure was approved by the City Council on June 16, 2005. The new rate structure will be effective January 1, 2006. Changes will be reflected on the February 20, 2006 water billing. This billing will include water usage beginning Jan. 1, 2006.

Why should I license my pet?

Good reasons provided by Salt Lake County Animal Services

People often wonder why they should license their pet. The most important thing to remember is that a license is a pet's best friend! It provides important and critical information for everyone who may come in contact with your pet. And, because cities and counties realize this, all have passed laws that require you to license your pet. The Herriman City ordinance states that all dogs, cats, and ferrets must be licensed. So, pet owners should license to avoid being in violation of the City code. However, a pet license has other benefits for the animal, the pet owner and the community that many people are not aware of.

Pet licensing is the primary method of ensuring dogs and cats are vaccinated for rabies, a serious public health concern. A rabies vaccine is required by state law for all dogs and cats and protects your pet from this deadly disease.

We all do whatever it takes to keep our pets safe and secure. At times, despite our best efforts, a pet may wander away and become lost. A license is the best way Animal Services' officers have to reunite pets with their owners if this happens. A pet wearing a license tag can quickly and easily be identified and returned to the pet owner, sometimes without ever going to the shelter. And, if an animal is found by an officer and is seriously injured, a license guarantees that the animal will be immediately taken to a veterinarian for emergency care. This can mean the difference between life and death for a badly injured animal, which unfortunately are received almost daily at the shelter.

Getting a pet license is simple and convenient. You can print the application from the Animal Services' website, www.slcoanimalservices.org, or you can call (801) 269-7402 to license by phone. All you need is a copy of your pet's rabies vaccination certificate from your veterinarian. And, if your pet is spayed or neutered, a license for a pet in Herriman is only \$5.00 per year. If your pet needs a rabies vaccine, don't worry! You can visit our rabies/license/microchip clinic on January 28th at Qquirrh Hills Veterinary and get everything taken care of in one trip. Remember, a license is your pet's phone call home!

Robert Dansie

A Recipient of the Citizens of Legacy Award 2005

Robert Dansie was born February 5, 1825 in Boxford, England, to James and Sarah Chenery. He married Charlotte Rudland on April 8, 1849. They joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints shortly after their marriage. They had seven children, two of which died very young. Robert and Charlotte decided to join the saints in the Great Salt Lake Valley. They traveled 200 miles by train, horse and buggy to board a ship in Liverpool, and sailed for America with their five children on May 12, 1862. When they arrived they were taken in by Ansel P. Harmon Company to go across the plains. It was a long hard journey and ended in sorrow when Charlotte and her newborn infant died during childbirth near Pacific Springs, Nebraska. Robert put a strand of blue beads around Charlotte's neck and covered her face and the boy with the top of a large trunk that held their belongings. He placed a large rock over her grave as a marker. He left in silent anguish of soul with his remaining five little ones at his side. Robert loved Charlotte dearly.

Jane Wilcox was in the same company and helped Robert with his little ones. He married her in December of 1862, and they eventually had 10 more children. Jane raised Charlotte's children as if they were her own.

Robert and Jane lived in Bingham Creek while Robert herded sheep. Jane washed and mended clothes for the miners and gold dust panners, for which they would pay her with gold dust. Her earnings, along with Robert's and the older boys, were used to buy property in Herriman. Robert Dansie was the first to build so far west, outside of the main Fort settlement in about 1867. He first built a one room dugout and then a log cabin was built over it. Eventually he built a two story rock home in 1869 that still stands today. He was a sheep rancher, farmer, a skilled gardener, and it is written that he was the one that introduced alfalfa to Herriman.

Robert was a personal friend of Brigham Young. He was known for his generosity, friendly manner, and kindness to the poor and needy. He was honest in his dealings with others. His faith was great, as was his devotion to his family. He was one of the first directors of the Herriman Water Company in 1892, and a stockholder in the Herriman Irrigation Company when it first incorporated in 1893, as well as a member of the 93rd Quorum of Seventies. He served a mission to England in 1879, but due to heart problems he was only there for five months. He was the Bishop of the Herriman Ward from 1887 to 1896. He was a steady man who held fast to the goals he set for himself and followed them through to accomplishment. Hence he worked beyond his strength for the betterment of his community, his family and his church. His legacy lives on in Herriman today with many of his descendants still living in Herriman and the surrounding area.
