**From Mayor J. Lynn Crane**

We in the City offices have received many positive comments about the City newsletter. I hope that residents find it useful and a service to assist in staying informed about City activities and other local newsworthy information. Herriman has grown almost as a young seedling plant beginning to sprout in an effort to establish itself as a strong, healthy, and productive contributor to the environment that sustains it. One of the distinguishing components of its success is the people that were here in the beginning and the many that have come here to live since that historic June 1<sup>st</sup>, 1999. There were 777 within the boundaries on the day that the application for incorporation was submitted. There are now approximately 15,000. Among the old and new residents are those who have distinguished themselves with their time and their talent in volunteer service. The opportunities have been many and the effort has been extraordinary. Hundreds of thousands of dollars in value have been accrued through committee and individual voluntary hours at the equestrian facilities, playground facilities, park and cemetery development, Fort Herriman Day celebrations, pageants, parades, and many other efforts. The people have made the difference. People always have and they always will be the center of any worthy endeavor.

There continues to be many opportunities to be involved in volunteer activities. There are a number of standing councils and committees that provide a variety of community services. The Herriman City Arts Council, created over five years ago, has established traditions that influence and affect many who live within the community, especially, the children of Herriman. The very successful Fort Herriman Day celebrations of the past few years are the results of efforts given by members of the Arts Council. Other activities supported by the Arts Council include the Miss Herriman Scholarship Pageant, the Herriman Arts and Talent Show, support for Easter activities, Cinema in the Park, Pumpkin Festival, neighborhood decoration awards at Christmas, and the Broadway Music Review.

The Herriman History Committee has been very successful over the past few years. One of the primary objectives of the incorporation of Herriman was the preservation of our historical identity. The History Committee is certainly committed to the satisfaction of this important objective through supporting endeavors with a primary focus on programs like "Citizens of Legacy," oral histories, historical photographs and diaries, and many other efforts that will ultimately culminate with the publication of a history of Herriman book.

The City has a standing Equestrian Committee that has been a significant factor in design and construction of the equestrian facilities at Butterfield Park. This committee contributes to equestrian activities throughout each year, especially providing much of the effort required for the success of the youth and adult rodeos connected to the Fort Herriman Days Celebration. They are also involved in assisting with the preparation of the first annual Memorial Day Professional Rodeo beginning on the upcoming Memorial Day weekend.

The Herriman Lions Club has rendered a long and significant community service. Established over fifty years ago, the club has a legacy of service to the community and its residents. The Club is actively seeking new members and encourages anyone with interest

in a service club to consider joining. Historical activities by the Lions Club include the annual Chuck Wagon Breakfast on Memorial Day morning, Easter Egg Hunts for children, the preservation of sight, Halloween activities, etc.

A more recent committee is sponsored and supported by IHC. With the coming of a new IHC hospital just east of our boundary, IHC has formed a citizen's community advisory committee. This committee is seeking volunteers for participation in projects or activities that will enhance community health environments.

Someone has said, "The difference between ordinary and extraordinary is just that little extra." Herriman volunteers have given that "little extra" and have produced extraordinary accomplishments. The City parks enjoy playground equipment that has been assembled by volunteer groups. Thousands of man hours assembled the equestrian arenas at W & M Butterfield Park and unmeasured volunteer hours and donated equipment excavated the land and prepared W & M Butterfield Park to become the beautiful facility that it is; indeed, the land itself was the result of a generous gift to the City.

Ronald Reagan wrote, "No matter how big and powerful government gets, and the many services it provides, it can never take the place of volunteers." I express my deepest appreciation for all that has been done as Herriman has emerged from the tender seedling of its infancy into the state of vitality and strength that it enjoys today. ## Herriman City Operations

Can you believe we are almost starting into spring? A sure sign of this is that baseball sign ups have already happened. Herriman Baseball has reported that they had a successful sign up.

We have not received much snow this year but we are pushing ahead to start preparing things to wake up from their winter slumber. Even though we have gone through winter already we have still been able to get work done as permitted on the Rosecrest Park located at 13850 South 5600 West. We still have great plans to plant some 90 plus trees and have already put up the main structure to four gazebos and started to install the playground equipment.

The City has three sites for which we have already received playground equipment and we are asking for your help. In the immediate sites we will be sending out door hangers to invite you to come and join us on a Saturday to help put together the playgrounds. The first site is between Autumn Dusk and Emmeline, the second is between Emmeline and Rosecrest Road, and the third will be in the Cove at Herriman Springs up Rose Canyon Road. We have found by joining hand in hand with employees of the City and the residents that we have great success in assembling the majority of the playground equipment economically and effectively. The residents feel some ownership because they help install the equipment and the City is able to buy more equipment rather than pay out a lot in labor costs, plus we get to know the residents much better. We hope to see you out there. Look for more information on this sometime soon.

We have heard from many residents this winter regarding concerns and compliments about snow removal. We still have a problem with parked cars on the street and have had the Sheriffs Department issue citations to try to enforce our ordinance. When there are a lot of cars and equipment on the street it makes it very difficult to clear the streets properly. So, we turn to you again for help with this dilemma. If you know of a problem on your street give us a call and we will attend to it.

We have good news about the Splash Park located at approximately 14050 S. Rosecrest Road. The developer hopes to have it installed and open by Memorial Day weekend. Also, the City is submitting an RFP for design of the skateboard park. At this time we have not settled for sure on a site. We have looked at numerous locations but nothing has worked out yet. There is still a huge need for this type of facility; just watch on good weather days at how many kids take their skateboards to the middle school. This tells me that we have not seen all the supporters for a skateboard park to our meetings. We will be involving residents with the design after we have selected a company that meets the standard City requirements for this facility.

We hope you will keep checking on the calendar of events and enjoy the upcoming activities throughout the year whether it is a sport or a community function. It's a great time to get involved with your City. If you have any questions or would like to volunteer with the playground installations please call the Parks Department at 254-7667 to get involved with this great opportunity.

The City will be offering it's dumpster for spring cleanup again in the month of May. We will be mailing out passes in the water bills for you to use so that you will be able to dump waste materials in the dumpsters. The opportunity is only available to the residents of Herriman City. If you do not receive one of these passes, you may pick them up at the Herriman City Offices when you give proof of residency in Herriman City.

## **Code Enforcement**

The Herriman City Code Enforcement Officer does routine patrols through neighborhoods and commercial areas in the city limits year-round. At times, concerned citizens call to let us know where to look, or who we can assist in meeting the requirements of the Herriman City Ordinances.

Here is a brief look at the process taken every time a violation is reported to our office: A street address or specific location (such as NE corner of Main & Vine St.) is required. It is not required that a complainant leaves a name or phone number. It can be helpful if one is left, though, so we can provide updates to the complainant on the status or outcome of the case. Once a complaint is received the Code Enforcement Officer goes out to physically see the property and any violations. This insures that all violations are covered and any others in the general area are taken care of so as not to isolate or "pick out" just one person in the neighborhood.

Most citizens strive to comply with the City Ordinances, but there are some that do not.

Depending on the situation, type and extent of the violation, there are options available to achieve compliance. The most common options are to issue Courtesy Notices and Warning Notices to help make citizens aware of the Ordinance violations. Another option is for the City to correct or abate the violation and then place a lien on the property in the amount billed plus the costs incurred for administrative processing. A third option is to have a criminal complaint filed in Municipal Court where the violator must appear before the judge and the decision is then made regarding assessed penalties, if any, and what steps will be taken to abate the violation. The whole process can take a few days or several months.

**Home Fire Protection Checklist**

- Do you have smoke alarms on every floor of your home and near or inside all sleep areas? New construction requires a smoke alarm in each bedroom. It is recommended that alarms be wired together, so if one sounds they all sound.
- Do your smoke alarms have fresh batteries and do they work? They should be tested monthly.
- Are any smoke alarms in your home more than 10 years old? If so, replace them.
- Does your family have a home fire escape plan, and have you practiced it?
- Do you have portable fire extinguishers readily available and are they in good working condition?
- Automatic home fire sprinkler systems can control or extinguish fires quickly. Some insurance companies give discounts to home owners who have them installed. Have you considered having a sprinkler system installed?

**Salt Lake County Sheriff's Department**

The Sheriff's Office maintains a visible presence in Herriman conducting traffic enforcement to increase public safety. We would like to educate Herriman City residents about vehicle-related laws some people are either not aware of or have become complacent towards.

**Parking on Streets Prohibited**

- There is no overnight parking on the streets between November and April.
- The plows cannot effectively clear obstructed streets.
- Vehicles may not be left on the street over 24 hours.
- Don't use the street as a long-term overflow parking lot. Even if they don't say anything, your neighbors don't like to see your unused car out there day after day.

**Wrong Way on Street Ordinance**

- Vehicles are to be parked with the right-side tires within 12 inches of the curb. This is the "wrong way on the street" ordinance.
- A properly parked vehicle alerts passing motorists of its presence with the reflectors built in to the rear taillight assembly. Also, the **only** way to park the wrong way on a two-way street is by going into the on-coming lane.

**License Plates**

- Utah issues two license plates; one for the front bumper, one for the rear.
- We can appreciate that you are a huge (Favorite Team Here) fan or that the standard Utah plate is not esthetically

pleasing on the front of your new SUV but you really need to put that front plate on.

**Update your Information**

- Herriman is a rapidly growing community where residents celebrating their first anniversary in their homes are practically pioneers. We are required to update a change of address for both drivers licenses and vehicle registrations within 10 days of moving. In this age of identity theft the Post Office won't forward your renewals and risk sending your personal information somewhere they can't confirm you reside; you probably won't get either renewal at your new address.

**Spring Flooding**

I know there are those of you who love to strap little sticks to your feet and slide down a frozen wonderland. Personally I can't wait for winter to be over. It really hasn't been too bad, but spring always brings us problems to deal with in the Building Dept. Every year the number one complaint we get in the spring is flooding problems. The ground is usually saturated to its limits and then we will get a wet storm to add on to it. I know this is a very touchy subject for some. We have set up many standards and procedures to help eliminate many of the problems we see at the final inspection of the home. We have seen dramatic reduction in the number of flooded homes and yards. The truth is, in eight or nine out of ten flooded areas we see the same problems occurring. Almost all of these issues could be eliminated with some caution taken by homeowners. The following are some ways to help avoid the problems:

- Check all of your downspouts and see where they run to. If they terminate near the home's foundation they need to be moved. Purchase some extensions and attach them to lead the water five feet or more away from the home.
- Check around the entire home and make sure there is a slope away from the house. The Building Code asks for at least a 5% slope away from the home. This is a very minimum amount. More is always better. The problem is that the first two or three feet around the foundation is backfilled area. Over time and saturation, the areas settle and then we see a reverse slope. Add the water from your roof and it is usually disastrous.
- Check where the water is running or could run from all property lines around your property. There are so many hillside lots in Herriman, and it is difficult to keep water from carving out a path to your neighbor. If there is a way that you can slow the water down (grass, straw bales, small channel) try to eliminate the problem before it gets to difficult to work with.

If there are problems you know of with your house when you go through this checklist, please feel free to call the City Building Department. We usually can suggest some ideas that help ease the problem. I know there will still be problems. It seems water has a mind of its own sometimes. I really believe that if you just take the time and go through this checklist, it will help prevent many of the problems we see every spring. We really do appreciate the people that help do these things and do their part. Thanks from the Herriman City Building Department.

## Engineering Department

We have seen some major improvements in the IT (Information Technology) and GIS (Geographical Information System) fields in the City. We recently upgraded our building department software to a program called Blue Prince. This has been a major undertaking to convert all the previous software's information into the new system and make the transformation as smooth as possible. This new software will help streamline the Building Department's approval and inspection process. Contractors will be able to go online to apply for permits and schedule inspections. They will also be able to get real time results on building inspections. The Building Department's help in this process has been invaluable.

We have performed audits in the GIS department on street lights, water, storm drains, and roads. We are currently reviewing and updating the data in the database to make sure we have the best possible information on the City and its infrastructure. The GIS information is used to track the assets and maintenance of the City's roads, water, storm drains, street lights, signs, trails, parks, and other city owned property. As we lay the groundwork for the GIS now it will continue to be a valuable asset to the City for years to come.

## Herriman Municipal Water Service

It has come to our attention that there is a considerable amount of concern regarding the fluoride being injected into the water system. The residents of Salt Lake County approved and voted this action in 2002. By law we are required to inject fluoride into our municipal water system. Herriman City Municipal Water Department will continue to stay in compliance with all rules set forth by the State of Utah Division of Drinking Water. Since there is fluoride injected into the water system, there is no need for any age children to take fluoride tablets. If you do continue to take the tablets in addition to drinking water with fluoride in it, your child could develop a symptom called mottling, which is evidenced by spots on their teeth, as a result of too much fluoride. We monitor our injection of fluoride everyday including weekends to make sure that we are not over-injecting or under-injecting the fluoride into our system. If in the event that there ever was an over-dosing into the water we have alarms that alert us that there is an over-dosing.

We are also happy to announce that we will be receiving a new water source from Jordan Valley Water from the Bingham Canyon Water Treatment Plant that Kennecott Copper has built to treat contaminated water from the mining processes over the last 100 years. It is called the Southwest Jordan Valley Groundwater Project. You are invited to attend an open house to learn about the new water source in our community, made possible through the Southwest Jordan Valley Groundwater Project. During the open house you will be able to talk to project managers, taste the water from this new source and ask questions. The open house will be on Wednesday, March 22<sup>nd</sup>, from 4:30 to 7:30 p.m. at the Herriman City Offices. In the water bill for February there is more information about the Jordan Valley Groundwater project and in the coming months we will be sending out more information about our backflow and cross connection program.

It will soon be the time when sprinkler systems will be starting up and in use. We would like to remind you that all sprinkler systems require a backflow assembly device. It will no longer be allowed that a double check backflow assembly can be used with a sprinkling system. All sprinkling systems are required to have an RP

which stands for a reduced pressure principle backflow prevention assembly.

We in the water department hope that you have had a fun and exciting winter season, and are looking forward to the coming spring. If you have any questions regarding anything relating to the water system, please feel free to call the Water Department in the City Offices.

**Herriman Historical Committee**  
**A Recipient of the Citizens of Legacy Award 2005**



**Mary Jane Parker Butterfield**

Mary Jane Parker was born on January 21, 1817, in Parsonfield York County, Maine. She is the daughter of Samuel and Hannah Edgcomb Parker. Mary Jane was slight of build, just 5 feet tall, with black hair and bright, expressive eyes. She was taught early to work. Mary Jane was 18 when she married Thomas Butterfield in Farmington, Maine. Soon afterwards, they attended a meeting and heard the Prophet Joseph Smith tell of the restored gospel. They were immediately converted and baptized by Thomas' uncle, Josiah Butterfield.

Life was difficult for the new couple. They experienced many hardships. Mary Jane was faithful and courageous in taking care of their home and protecting her family. She earned a living for her family for over a year when Thomas was sent on a mission. Thomas was good with animals and was called upon to help the Saints move from Ohio to Missouri, and then to Illinois. Mary Jane packed their belongings herself in a wagon and drove the oxen. When living in Missouri, two men came to the Butterfield home while Thomas was away, climbed on the house and knocked a hole in the roof, intending to throw a burning faggot inside. With authority Mary Jane commanded them to leave. The men never returned.

Soon after the first Relief Society was organized in Nauvoo, Mary Jane became a member. She helped the sick, made clothing, and knitted stockings for the men working on the temple. Many years later, Mary Jane recalled the experience of being part of that first Relief Society, "..... (the sisters) should do a good work and be a great help to the Church. I was a member of the Society and enjoyed myself very much in meeting with the sisters."

Mary Jane was talented and artistic. When settled in Utah, the family raised sheep and cattle. Mary Jane carded and spun the wool. She would have cans on the stove steeping sage and berries, adding a little of this and that until she achieved the dye color she wanted. She was an excellent weaver. She gathered weeds, flowers, and bark to create pleasing arrangements for her home. Mary Jane was a quilt maker of record in Herriman. There is an example of her Log Cabin quilt still preserved. She was a member of the first Relief Society in Herriman, serving as teacher and treasurer.

In 1858, when the Salt Lake Valley was evacuated, Thomas was again asked to help coordinate animals and wagons for the move. Mary Jane was left to load the wagon by herself. She drove the team to Santaquin with two-month old Hannah on her lap, and her sister-wife, Mary Farmer, in labor with her first child in the back of the wagon.

With her husband, Thomas, Mary Jane settled Herriman in 1851. She lived in a log cabin for 19 years until a rock home was built and the family moved out of the Fort. She was the mother of 13 children, 11 living to adulthood. Mary Jane died in Herriman on July 21, 1901.

Mary Jane was an example of pioneer faith and fortitude, persevering through trials and hardships to establish a legacy for her posterity and community.
