A public hearing for comment on the proposed 2006-2007 City Budget was noticed and conducted at the regularly scheduled City Council Meeting on June 1, 2006. Few were in attendance. One resident made response before the Council regarding the proposed budget. Approval for the 2006-2007 Herriman City Budget was given at the City Council Meeting on June 15, 2006.

The budget is a comprehensive financial undertaking. It requires hours and hours of preparation and consideration. Always, an annual budget has implications that affect every resident and the 2007 budget will impact every resident in Herriman. I have reported in newsletters and other opportunities to speak to the issue of fiscal accountability of the effort to counter a fast growing community's dependency upon developmental revenues (one time revenues) with traditional methods of generating revenue that will provide for dependable funding for operation and maintenance, municipal services, and public safety. Traditional methods include property taxation, sales tax revenues, and traditional resources like franchise and service fees. Commercial and retail development that generates sales tax is one method pursued by every municipality and Herriman has and continues to increase its commercial tax base. Sales tax revenues have continued to increase and in the new budget year will amount to approximately 29% of tax revenues to the City. That being the case, it is also apparent that expectations for sufficient growth in sales tax revenue to balance the one-time funds will be inadequate for some time. The primary economic development in the southwest sector of the valley is targeted along the Bangerter Highway Corridor. Recognizing the reality of this and that it is unlikely to change until roadway development occurs within the Mountain View Corridor, Herriman has been forced to accept the fact that retail services will likely be confined to neighborhood retailers and other service providers. Sales tax revenues will increase but will likely be unable to balance with the developmental sources.

Perhaps the most frequent question submitted to me personally and often asked in the public setting of City Council and Planning Commission meetings is, "what is the City doing to prepare for an almost certain slowing of the economy?" The 2007 Budget takes a huge step forward in reducing dependency on one-time revenues for general fund operating and maintenance costs. To address this problem, the City Council approved the creation of a "public safety enterprise fund" within the City budget and approved the imposition of a public safety fee of \$25.00 per month per household to fund the enterprise. The fee is calculated to cover the costs of law enforcement. This decision effectively removes the costs of law enforcement from the general fund. The fund will increase as the number of households within the community increases and is designed to generate increased revenue as the need for law and enforcement increases. The Enterprise Fund will be used exclusively for public safety, and residents will have some satisfaction in knowing that generated revenues will not be spent for other endeavors within the City. The fee will be assessed and collected with the water utility payment as is the fee for park and recreation service. There will be many questions and the following will attempt to provide the answers to some of them:

1. Why a fee based fund rather than a property tax levy? Perhaps the most unfair form of taxation is the property tax. It certainly is a reliable tax and generates funds upon which a municipality can rely each year. However, it collects much more money from some than others and, in reality, exempts many residents who participate and receive services within a community. A public safety fee is basically a user fee and assesses all residents equally whether or not they own properties.
2. Why the imposition of such a burden all at one time rather than in increments the next two or three years? The decision of the City Council is based upon the thought that incremental increases each year is more offensive to residents than making the decision once. While this is a significant increase it is anticipated that this fee will

cover the costs of these services into the foreseeable future without a continuing escalation.

3. Will there be any consideration to seniors and others with limited incomes and resources? Yes. Salt Lake County maintains a "circuit breaker" program that provides for breaks or reduction in property tax assessments. The documentation for eligibility for the "circuit breaker" will be used as justification for consideration on the public safety fee. Residents will be required to provide that information to the City and the public safety fee will be reduced by fifty percent to the amount of \$12.50 per month.
4. Does the fee have to be paid monthly with the water billing or can it be paid on a quarterly or annual basis? Quarterly or annual payments will be accommodated. Billing status will be reflected on each month's bill.

While this fee is recognized as a significant burden, a recent comparison of billings from another municipality in the Valley, was interesting. Not only was the water charge double that of Herriman's rates, the billing included \$60.00 of additional fees levied for various services within the community. It is recognized that Herriman fees are not the lowest of the communities in the Valley; however, they certainly are not among the highest. The high benchmark for service established by the City must be funded each year.

Other features of the general fund, 2007 budget:

- Total general fund projected revenue equals \$10,395,189.
- General fund expenditures are independent from, for the most part, developmental or one-time revenues. Will there always be developmental or one-time funding. The answer is yes; however, dependency upon these revenues for more than 18-22% of general fund expenditures would be imprudent. The 2007 budget, in general, meets these criteria.
- The 2007 budget also includes \$12,543,000 of capital improvements funded by earmarked impact fee revenues.
- It retires debt service at the W & M Butterfield Park. This bond has been satisfied 16 years before maturity.
- It provides revenue for the acquisition of property for a future "civic center." The property is projected as the site for a full-service library, federal post office, new city hall with adequate space for full judicial services, and a small performing arts theater at some point in time. Other amenities consistent with municipal services may be accommodated as well.
- Information of interest: The City certified tax rate for the 2007 budget year is .001882. This represents a decrease from the 2001 budget certified tax rate of .002318. This represents a decrease in the tax you pay on each \$100,000 of assessed value on your property of \$43.60. I understand that the assessed value of every property in Herriman has increased and the total tax paid is likely higher today than it was in 2001; however, the tax rate has decreased. In 2001 a property owner paid \$231.80 on each \$100,000 of assessed value. In this budget the same property owner will pay \$188.20 for each \$100,000 of assessed value.

I appreciate that this is a long article but it is hoped that it provides pertinent information regarding budget policy. The Council has had great support for which I express appreciation.

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## Operations Department

If you haven't already noticed, the City has had huge success at the new Splash Pad. We knew it would become a favorite this summer for the community, but no one can know how great a success something will be until it is already here. The City is planning on installing restrooms at the Splash Pad because of the thousands of people (in reality just a few hundred) who are taking advantage of this great new park. Until then the City has already ordered some port-o-johns to place there until the restrooms are built. We are asking for some help from the parents in regards to parking along the street on Rosecrest Road. To control this issue and bring it to a minimum, the developer has verbally agreed to allow you to park on their commercial piece of property just south of the Splash Pad. The City will make an access from this property to the park. Please utilize this area as a parking lot to help control the parking issue. This will also help to keep your children off the street when you are getting in and out of your vehicles. It might cause your car to get a little dirty but it will be much safer for you and your children. Another way you can help when using this park is to take more concern when crossing Rosecrest Road. There is a crosswalk at Mirabella and Rosecrest Road, and another one just north of Callander. Please utilize these areas to cross this road. The City will also look at installing more gazebos to keep the children and families out of the direct sunlight while they are drying off. The City is looking at other places to install more parks such as this as we grow and property becomes available.

There is so much going on in the planning stages. It seems like when we get one park completed we are already brainstorming others and trying to figure out other demands of the City. The Rosalina Park detention basin dirt work is complete and we are now moving on to the landscaping issues. The Rose Creek Ranches Park detention basin is 2/3 complete and then we will be moving on to landscaping and adding other amenities. A great success story in Herriman this year is the laying of asphalt for a hard surface trail system starting in Creek View going through Herriman Meadows

then through Rosecrest up to Mirabella and through Autumn Dusk Park. We've had several compliments from mothers being able to get through this area with their strollers and that their children can ride their bikes through this area much easier. We will be looking at putting a harder surface through Rose Creek subdivision, particularly in the Ranches area, to help connect to the rest of our trail system.

We had a wonderful turn out for the early Herriman Town Day's festivities at the horse pulls, the Jr. Rodeo, and the IMPRA Rodeo. I hope everyone got to participate in the Fort Herriman Days Activities at the different booths, park events, entertainment, and Step Rock Run. I am hopeful that residents were able to pick up information on emergency preparedness and safety issues. We hope everyone enjoyed the fireworks in the last couple of weeks. The fireworks have such a beautiful backdrop here in this part of the valley.

We are working on several street improvement projects. One will be by Herriman Elementary to improve the safety for the children. We have installed NO PARKING signs on the east side of 6000 West, but people continue to park there, even when they have received citations. The City Council approved installing curb, gutter, and sidewalk down to the corner of 6000 West and 13200 South. This will give an area for children to walk along the sidewalk rather than the walking path where cars have been parking. We hope to have this work completed during the window of time while the children are off school before they start their new school year.

Some of the projects we are doing this year and in the past involve a park, street, ordinance violation or just for the overall safety of the community. Your concerns, complaints, or comments are always taken seriously and addressed. Issues may not always be handled the way residents want the issue to be resolved, but everything is considered and addressed. We always appreciate resident's comments. Lately we have received numerous compliments on the City's efforts to keep the streets clean. We truly thank you for your compliments; they come rarely, and are greatly appreciated.

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## Code Enforcement

On June 1<sup>st</sup> the Herriman City Council passed a new ordinance regarding the parking of commercial vehicles on public roadways. Ordinance 11.20.060 prohibits the parking of commercial vehicles along any street in Herriman, unless actively loading or unloading cargo. This is a change from the old ordinance, which allowed commercial vehicle parking for up to three consecutive hours. The new ordinance also provides for the impoundment of the commercial vehicle, at the owner's expense, if it receives three or more notices or citations in a 180 day period.

Weeds are becoming a problem in some areas of Herriman. Some property owner's have allowed weeds to grow well in excess of the six inch limit. As well as being unsightly, this time of year the weeds present a serious fire danger. With summer temperatures, the weeds quickly dry and are extremely flammable. Herriman City Ordinance 9.60.020, requires that weeds be kept under six inches and shall be cleared from the property. The cuttings shall be removed from the premises.

The City has the option to remove the weeds from the property and require a fee from the property owner for all cost incurred. The City also can assess a daily fine in the amount of \$100 per day for as long as the violation exists. Honestly, it's a lot less trouble and cheaper to mow them or rent a weed whacker and remove them before Ordinance Enforcement gets involved.

Warm weather has arrived and we are busy mowing lawns, weeding flower beds, cleaning out garages, bike riding, golfing, and participating in many other activities. With the warm weather we tend to spend more time

outside of our homes and we also have a tendency to let our guard down concerning theft.

With the warm weather, garage doors tend to go up. Many times they stay up all day, placing all of their contents on display. The would-be thief may simply drive through the neighborhood shopping for the items that are most desirable. These items may include your new golf clubs, that mountain bike you spent days shopping for, lawn mowers, power tools, or the purse left in the front seat of the car.

How do you prevent your possessions from being stolen out of your garage? Simply keep your garage door closed any time you are not working inside it or can see it from where you may be working in your yard. Any time your garage door is open your entire house is at risk. You may want to consider installing a garage entry keypad if you do not have one. This will make it easier for you or your children to access the garage from outside when coming and going with bikes, scooters, or using your lawn mower.

Another common practice of thieves is to walk the neighborhood pretending to sell something or ask for directions. While you are in your backyard working in the garden, they are ringing your doorbell. If there is no answer, they check the front door to see if it is locked. If not, inside they come and straight to the kitchen table where women frequently keep their purse. They are back outside in a few seconds and off around the corner to see what treasures are in the purse.

To prevent this type of theft from occurring, keep your front door locked at all times; even when you are home. This is the best way to keep you and your property safe. It may take a while to get in the habit, but once you do, you will find that it is an easy adjustment and will be well worth the effort.

Most thefts are crimes of opportunity. Very few thieves desire to break a window or door to take a chance on what may be on the other side. Keep your valuables out of site. Don't park bikes and scooters in the front yard. They are simply too easy a target. Keep your garage doors closed and your front door locked, even when at home. If you do these things, it is likely that you will not become a victim this summer.

There are still many who will fall victim despite these precautions or lack thereof. Please take the time now before it occurs to take an inventory of your property. Document the model and serial numbers of all your items so that you can provide these to the Sheriff's Office if needed. This will not only help increase our ability to recover your property, but it will also help you deal with your insurance company.

## 2006 Fire Season

There is a battle front in our City that we may not think about often enough. The 2006 fire season has begun in Utah and our neighborhoods do share ground with potential fire areas. Even though we are not in a wooded area, grass fires can move very quickly. Herriman City Building Department would like to share some points that might help just in case.

**Time to do that yard work.** Your yard can be your first, best stand against a wildfire. You can keep a fire from getting anywhere near the house itself with some simple landscaping and maintenance. Look around your yard. See those areas where leaves collect? Those are the same places where the wind will carry burning embers during a wildfire. You can create a defensible space against wildfires. Rake and remove leaves. Clear dead brush and dense vegetation. Store your firewood pile and other things that burn easily at least 30 to 100 feet away from the house.

**Extra Tip:** To keep sparks and flames from getting underneath anything, screen under your porch and other open areas with wire mesh no larger than 1/8 inch.

**Check your landscaping.** When landscaping around your property, choose plants with high moisture content. They are more fire-resistant and can help to create a firebreak around your home. Mow your grass and control the height and spread of ground covering vegetation. Keep plants at least 12 to 18 inches away from the house.

Trees and shrubs are fine, if well spaced, watered and properly pruned. Remove dead or low-hanging branches. Make sure to cut all tree limbs around your chimney and any dead branches that hang over your roof. And, keep an eye on any limbs that may come in contact with power lines. Keep your gutters, eaves and roof clear of leaves and other debris.

**What about other structures?** Decks, porches, fences, and out buildings should be considered part of your home. They need as much attention as the house itself. Keep wildfire safety in mind when making improvements to such structures.

Fences act like fuses or fuel bridges. They can lead a fire right to your home. A combustible wood fence attached to your house greatly increases the house's potential to ignite. Keep combustible vegetation away from fencing. Consider fire-resistant fencing or placing fencing away from structures when making improvements.

A trellis touching or close to the house can have a similar risk if it is made of a combustible material or covered with combustible vegetation. A patio deck can be hazardous in a wildfire, especially when combustible materials and debris accumulate beneath it. Clear debris below the patio deck and create a defensible space around it.

Fire can travel uphill extremely quickly. Elevated wooden decks built on hillsides can be especially hazardous because they are in the direct line of fire moving up the slope. When putting on a new patio deck, build from fire-resistant materials. On new and existing decks, create fire barriers around the deck base and clear vegetation at least 100 to 300 feet downhill from the deck base.

These simple, low-cost solutions can provide an additional level of protection to your home. However, in case of wildfire, if an evacuation is ordered, leave as soon as possible. Return home only after authorities say that it is safe to do so.

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## Herriman Municipal Water Service

Herriman City Municipal Water customers it is that time of year again, where we have received different questions and concerns that involve our water system that we would like to address.

Herriman City Municipal Water has not changed any of its water sources. The water hardness level is 470, which breaks down to 27 grains per gallon. The 27 grains per gallon is what you will need to adjust on your water softeners for those customers who have them in their home. The iron level is .1646 which falls well within what is required by the state of Utah.

We live in a desert and the water produced is hard in this area and always will be. To help avoid the white film on dishes and glasses and to help prevent white spots and film, the use of vinegar and any type of glass cleaning agents will be helpful.

With summer here and more people using their sprinkling systems we would like to remind you that your sprinkling systems should have a backflow prevention assembly. It should be tested ten days after initial installation and tested annually thereafter. Herriman City requires a copy of the test report be sent to Herriman City Municipal Water.

Another backflow prevention device is a hose bib vacuum breaker. It is a simple and inexpensive addition to your home's exterior faucets. It protects your home and your public water system against any source of contamination that your hose may come in contact with, such as chemical sprayers, buckets, swimming pools, etc. These devices may be purchased at many home improvement stores.

Currently Herriman City Municipal Water has no water restrictions for our customers; however, we do want to remind you that we live in a desert and ask that you are conscientious of your own personal use. We request that there be no watering between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. We do understand that with the growth we have that we have many new homes with sod and seed that need to be watered throughout the day.

Herriman City Municipal Water Department would like to provide you with some conservation tips for indoor and outdoor water use listed below.

### Indoors

1. Check toilets for leaks.
2. Don't use toilet as a waste basket.
3. Look into installing a low flow toilet or displace space in existing tank with a brick.
4. Only run full loads in the dishwasher and the washing machine.
5. Replace appliances with more efficient ones (the toilet uses the water indoors).
6. Fix leaky faucets, fixtures and hoses.
7. Take shorter showers.
8. Install water-saving shower heads.
9. Turn off faucet when brushing teeth, shaving, or washing face.
10. Store drinking water in the fridge, avoid running the tap to cool the water.

### Outdoors

1. Do not water between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.
2. Delay watering outdoors until needed, usually end of April or beginning of May.
3. Repair irrigation system leaks.
4. Tune-up and repair your irrigation system to water uniformly.
5. Adjust the sprinkler clock based on the seasons.
6. Turn automatic timers off when it is rainy or windy.
7. Irrigate in cycles to avoid run-off waste water, especially if you have clay soil.
8. Water plants with drip irrigation.
9. Consider using plants and turf that require less water.
10. Group plants by water need. Keep those that need extra water separate from those that need little water.
11. Hand water dry spots or stressed plants.
12. Use mulches to lessen evaporation.
13. Avoid water on the sidewalk or gutter.
14. Use a shut off nozzle on garden hose.
15. Sweep or blow the driveway instead of spraying with water.
16. Adjust lawnmower blade to three inches high.
17. Check swamp coolers for leaks.
18. Cover the pool when not in use.

### General Tips

1. Promote water conservation in our community.
2. Support and encourage water conservation with family, friends and neighbors.
